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David Bradford House

David Bradford was a successful lawyer, businessman, and Deputy Attorney General of Washington County. His house on South Main Street was constructed between 1786 and 1788, and reflected his high social standing, not only by its size, but also by its fittings.

At the height of the Whiskey Rebellion in 1794, President George Washington ordered 13,000 troops to Western Pennsylvania to suppress the insurrection. David Bradford fled south to Spanish West Florida (present-day Louisiana) to escape arrest but was tried in absentia and found guilty of treason. By 1797, he had built a home in St. Francisville. His wife, Elizabeth, and children joined him shortly thereafter. Eventually, David Bradford received a pardon from President John Adams for his role in the Whiskey Rebellion.
